To the Poínt - Needles

According to Wikipedia "A sewing needle, used for hand-sewing, is a long slender tool with a pointed tip at one end and a hole (or eye) at the other. The earliest needles were made of bone or wood; modern needles are manufactured from high carbon steel wire and are nickel- or 18K gold-plated for corrosion resistance. High quality embroidery needles are plated with two-thirds platinum and one-third titanium alloy. Traditionally, needles have been kept in needle books or needle cases which have become objects of adornment. Sewing needles may also be kept in an étui, a small box that held needles and other items such as scissors, pencils and tweezers."

Needles made from animal bone (most likely bird) date back to 60,000 years ago. The first needle made with an eyelet can be traced back 25,000 years. Armenian copper needles date back to 7,000 BC, when metal harnessing was developed.

Sewing needles evolved out of the necessity for humans to protect themselves from the elements during the most recent ice age. The use of needles in the arts can be found as early as the 4th Century BC.

Early sewing needles did not have an eye, but a split end which gripped the thread to be sewn, often raffia, gut, or sinew. Needles were fashioned according to materials available and the sewing work to be done. They were not only needed for the making of clothing, but also for medical applications, both straight and curved. The secrets of using steel for needle making originated in Persia, came to Spain through the Moors, and were brought to England through refugees. Needles were among a household's valuables, protected in special cases that women attached to their belts.

Needles are now mass produced with a variety and details of finish, including gold-plated grooves to keep protruding thread from damaging fabric.

Types of Sewing Needles and Their Uses



Beading Needles: Used to attach beads to the fabric or creating beaded projects, the eyes of these needles are very thin in order to go through the bead hole. The needle is delicate, which means sewing on thinner fabric is suggested when using this sewing needle type.

Betweens or Quilting Needles: This needle is short but sharp so that it can push through several layers of fabric. It is ideal for quilting because of the inconspicuous, tiny holes it forms while moving through the layers.

Chenille Needles: This needle is larger and has a very sharp point. Chenille needles are primarily used for adding decoration to sewing projects, particularly heavy fabrics. It is very similar to a tapestry needle but is sharper. Often used for ribbon embroidery.

Darning Needles: Also known as cotton darners, these hand sewing needles are used to darn and so they have long eyes, sharp points, and are longer in length.

Doll Needles: These needles are very thin and sharp. This type of sewing needle is used for sculpting for doll features on sewn doll projects.

Embroidery (Crewel) Needles: If you have seen hand sewing needles with large eyes, there's a good chance they were embroidery needles. Because decorative thread tends to be thicker, a large eye is needed. These needles are also long and thick.

Flat Needles: These are used to embroider with plate metallic embroidery thread. Also use in Japanese embroidery.

Leather Needles: Also known as wedge point needles or glover's needles, these have a triangle or wedge shape near the tip to help cut through thick materials such as leather, suede, vinyl, and similar fabrics.

Milliner's (Straw) Needles: These needles are long with round eyes and are traditionally used in the art of hat making. They are also used for pleating and creating fancy stitching commonly known as smocking and is the preferred needle to make bullion knots.

Sharps or Straight Point Needles: These are the general purpose needles that work for most projects because they are small and sharp and won't show needle holes as larger points may.

Tapestry Needles: This is a sewing needle that has a large eye. It is a large needle that has a blunt point. This needle is ideal for hand stitching and adding decorative touches, such as is done with tapestries. Used when a needle must pass between the threads rather than to pierce them. Often used for cross stitching.

Upholstery Needles: Often curved, these needles are one of the more unique sewing needle types. When curved, these needles can reach difficult places to sew. They are long and thick.

Yarn Needles: Available for hand sewing. Also known as yarn darners, these plastic needles are perfect for sewing yarn for crochet, knitting, and similar projects. Also great for beginners, especially kids.

from the sheets to decorate the aprons - nothing was wasted. One threadbare "everyday" apron even has an example of her mending. This chicken scratch apron was clearly made new from purchased gingham rather than from her typically repurposed fabric. It's the only example I

have of Rose's embroidery. She must have been proud of it because it's not worn like her everyday apron.

My grandmother, Rose, was much more a seamstress than an embroiderer; in fact, she worked in a clothing factory, mending "seconds" so that they could be sold instead of scrapped. All her embroidery backs are covered by hems or pleats, even the inside of the pocket. Rose was

famous for her neatly finished work. She was a young wife during the Depression. Most of her aprons were made from old

bed sheets. They include examples of appliquéd birds and flowers cut

April Technique Class Hardanger Embroidery April 10, 2021

Hardanger is a type of whitework that takes its name from the Hardanger region of southwest Norway in the country of Hordaland. Hardanger embroidery is worked on any evenweave fabric of which the threads may be cut and withdrawn. We will be using 28 count white linen in our class. Traditional Hardanger is worked with a thread color that matches the fabric, usually white or cream. This is a beginner class and will include some (but not all) basic Hardanger techniques. Our square includes kloster blocks, eyelets, woven bars, and dove's eyes. The square is decorated with basic cross stitch which will not be taught in class.

The kit for the class will contain 2 squares of 6"x 6" 28 count linen. One square will be used in the class for instructional purposes and the other square will be used for your final project. All threads and beads are included. You will need to supply a 4" embroidery hoop and your regular stitching supplies. Very sharp scissors would be very helpful for cutting

threads. The cost of the Hardanger kit is \$10.00.

Notable Budget Cuts for 2021 per the Financial Report Sherri Hagar, Treasurer: Education reimbursement reset to \$300.00. Bonus for chapters with over 60 primary members reset to \$150.00 Outreach reimbursement reduced to \$300.00

Silk Ribbon Embroidery on 18 Count Sandstone Vintage Canvas by Deborah Mitek Island Stitchery & Studio

Summer's End heralds one of the last flowers of summer, the sunflower. Join us as Deborah Mitek teaches us this charming design while learning the basics of silk ribbon embroidery and other canvas techniques. By using a variety of threads and silk ribbons in various widths, dimension and texture are created. The design uses Treenway 7mm silk ribbon, Caron Wildflowers & Watercolours, Silk Road Straw Silk, Rainbow Gallery Entice and Petite Silk Lame Braid, Kreinik #4 braid Luminescence, Mill Hill Seed Beas and 3mm faceted Gold Iris Round beads on a 10" x 10" taped and drawn, 18 count Sandstone Vintage Canvas background. The Van Dyke stitch, Peaks & Valleys, Turkey Work Variation, French Knots, the Ribbon Stitch, and bead embellishments are used to complete the design.

Kit includes 18 ct. Sandstone Vintage Canvas - taped with a line drawing, all threads and needles, Instruction Booklet including a large picture of the design, stitch guide, diagrams, detail photos.

Student will provide 10" x 10" Stretcher Bars for piece, tacks or staples, usual stitching supplies, trolley needle or wooden laying tool, stand/frameweight/ or clamp for hands-free stitching, optional light/magnifier.
