In case you missed the February monthly meeting ...

Hooped, Stretched or Snapped

Embroidery is probably one of the oldest methods of embellishing material. China, India and Egypt have evidence of embroidered clothing dating as far back as 5000BC. Embroidery was inspired by nature and the animal kingdom as well as geometric shapes. During the 11th Century embroidery was refined in the Arab world and during the Middle Ages fine and intricate embroidery became significant in the Western world for cloisters and ecclesiastical robes. During the 14th Century, embroidery was used to show off wealth and power, but once machines took over automation of embroidery, the importance of decorated material declined.

Stitching frames evolved as a tool alongside embroidery. Frames will help keep your work taught and straight so the finished product will have a pleasing appearance. The frame helps create straighter stitches, makes stitches easier to see and count on the base material, avoids pulling and puckering of the fabric and frees up your hands. The project stays neater as the work is handled less. The stitching project will determine the type of frame used. For greater comfort, frames can be attached to a table, lap or floor stands. Frames are suitable for projects that require a stabbing motion rather than a sewing motion. Originally made of wood, bone, or ivory, they are now made from wood, plastic or metal.


The Hoop is considered the oldest type of frame. It became popular in the 18th Century when it was imported from India along with Tambour embroidery. Tambour means drum in French - the hoop was used to stretch the fabric into the hoop as tight as a drum. Tambour embroidery uses a fine sharp hook that is punched through the cloth, catching a fine thread from underneath, and is then pulled up to create a chain-like stitch. The advantage was that the thread could be continuous, the designs varied and intricate and often incorporated beading. This type of embroidery was popular until 1834 when French machines could do it 140 times faster. When Helen A Harmes patented the invention of the adjustable embroidery hoop in 1903 it led to a renewed interest in embroidery in the US.

Hoops come in various shapes and materials: round, oval, square with rounded corners, mostly made from wood, plastic or metal. The motif to be embroidered should

fit inside the area of the hoop. If it does not fit, the hoop can be easily repositioned. To protect the embroidery both rings of the hoop should be wrapped with gauze or thin material cut into strips. Small or delicate pieces can be framed with muslin and then inserted into the hoop.



Scroll Rolls and Struts hold the embroidery piece taught, but unlike the hoop, a much larger area is available for embroidery. With heavy fabrics or canvas, this is a much easier method to frame up the work.

The rolls are lined with a fabric onto which the embroidery project is sewn. Excess fabric is then rolled up onto the scroll rolls and the tension is adjusted with the struts and secured into place with wing nuts. Once an area has been filled with embroidery, the wing nuts are loosened and the finished section is rolled up, making sure the fabric stays flat around the roll. A new section of the embroidery piece is now exposed to work on.



A **slate frame** has a similar function as the scroll frame, though its design is a little different. Instead of adjustable struts, the scroll rolls that hold the fabric are secured with adjustable pins. The fabric is also laced around the struts to make it really taught. When moving the fabric along, though, the lacing has to be removed and reapplied to the next section.

Stretcher bars are made from wood and come in different lengths that can be put together independently, depending on the size required. Some stretcher bars are also adjustable with a small screw to keep the work taught. The canvas or material is attached with metal tacks. These should be of high quality so as not to discolor the fabric. Generally, the size of the frame matches the size of the fabric.

Delicate fabrics can be framed with more robust material which is then either tacked or laced onto the stretcher bars.

Q-Snaps are a more modern variation of stretcher bars and popular with many stitchers as they are easily put together and simple to use. To prevent the fabric from slipping, many stitchers wrap the Q-Snap frame before attaching the clamps.

Stitching projects can take a long time to finish and require hours of work, but once completed it should look accomplished and neat. Stay in the right frame of mind by using the right frame for stitching!

EGA's mission is "... to inspire passion for the needle arts through education and the celebration of its heritage". Please join us during our technique classes throughout the yearheld the 2^{nd} Saturday of February, April, September, and November from 10am to 1pm.

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Mystery Píllow

Starting in April we will begin a series of 7 technique classes. In each of the first 6 technique classes we will produce a 3"x 3" square. Each square will be designed using the same color scheme and the plan is to construct a pillow using our technique squares in the 7th class. The squares will be stitched on 28 count white linen. If you choose to attend only some of these technique classes, you could finish your squares as ornaments or as a bell pull. The classes will be taught by Karen Heller and Karin Shaw. The pillow shown below is a first prototype and the actual final design will vary slightly.

April Technique Class Hardanger Embroidery April 10, 2021

Hardanger is a type of whitework that takes its name from the Hardanger region of southwest Norway in the country of Hordaland. Hardanger embroidery is worked on any evenweave fabric of which the threads may be cut and withdrawn. We will be using 28 count white linen in our class. Traditional Hardanger is worked with a thread color that matches the fabric, usually white or cream. This is a beginner class and will include some (but not all) basic Hardanger techniques. Our square includes kloster blocks, eyelets, woven bars, and dove's eyes. The square is decorated with basic cross stitch which will not be taught in class.

The kit for the class will contain 2 squares of 6"x 6" 28 count linen. One square will be used in the class for instructional purposes and the other square will be used for your final project. All threads and beads are included. You will need to supply a 4" embroidery hoop and your regular stitching supplies. Very sharp scissors would be very helpful for cutting threads. The cost of the Hardanger kit is \$10.00.

Silk Ribbon Embroidery on 18 Count Sandstone Vintage Canvas by Deborah Mitek Island Stitchery & Studio



Date: June 5, 2021

Summer's End heralds one of the last flowers of summer, the sunflower. Join us as Deborah Mitek teaches us this charming design while learning the basics of silk ribbon embroidery and other canvas techniques. By using a variety of threads and silk ribbons in various widths, dimension and texture are created. The design uses Treenway 7mm silk ribbon, Caron Wildflowers & Watercolours, Silk Road Straw Silk, Rainbow Gallery Entice and Petite Silk Lame Braid, Kreinik #4 braid Luminescence, Mill Hill Seed Beas and 3mm faceted Gold Iris Round beads on a 10" x 10" taped and drawn, 18 count Sandstone Vintage Canvas background. The Van Dyke stitch, Peaks & Valleys, Turkey Work Variation, French Knots, the Ribbon Stitch, and bead embellishments are used to complete the design.

Kit includes 18 ct. Sandstone Vintage Canvas - taped with a line drawing, all threads and needles, Instruction Booklet including a large picture of the design, stitch guide, diagrams, detail photos.

Student will provide 10" x 10" Stretcher Bars for piece, tacks or staples, usual stitching supplies, trolley needle or wooden laying tool, stand/frameweight/ or clamp for hands-free stitching, optional light/magnifier.


